Holt Copse Conservation Volunteers (HCCV): Use of Nest Boxes, 2021 (Year 16)

The nest boxes in Holt Copse were taken down, checked and cleaned in January 2022. The boxes in one section of the wood were vandalised during the summer when seven were knocked off the supporting nails. Both wooden boxes were destroyed and most of the stone ones were broken, but were repairable and were reinstalled in March 2022. Once again a high percentage (82 %) of the boxes were used and most clutches of tits probably fledged successfully for only one skeleton and the occasional unhatched eggs (1 or 2, and in one nest 3) were found. A higher proportion of the stone nest boxes were used compared with the wooden ones, so although they are more expensive the birds seem to prefer them and last far longer. Nuthatches had used 3 nest boxes, the most recorded. As usual the owl box contained much debris, a rather unpleasant mixture of old food and droppings!
